## Staff Report

Mr. Gaudio, Project and Real Estate Manager, stated that this vacation would eliminate a public sidewalk easement while retaining the area for a public utility easement. He described the easement as a seven-foot easement which is a remnant from Pacific Avenue, a portion of which was vacated in 1952. Mr. Gaudio noted that the sidewalk does not serve any public purpose, and that the applicants have requested the vacation of the sidewalk easement for safety purposes, adding that such vacation would require the installation of gates at Sparks Street and Beachwood Street which would in effect isolate the area and reserve a public utility easement.

Campos requested Council consideration Mrs. appointment to the Community Development Goals Committee for one unexpired term, ending June 1, 2004, and two appointments to the unfilled terms ending June 1, 2006. She summarized that the City Clerk's Office began advertising for applicants to this committee on April 6, 2002, with the deadline to submit applications set at May 17, and as of that date, only two applications had been received, both from incumbents. Mrs. Campos noted that at the meeting of May 28, the Council appointed the two incumbent applicants, and directed staff to continue advertising for the remaining vacancies. She stated that the City Clerk's office was notified of a resignation on the committee on May 31, 2002, bringing the total vacancies on the committee to three, and added that advertising for applicants continued until October 8, by which time seven applications had been received.

Mrs. Campos informed the Council that a random drawing had been conducted in the City Clerk's office to select the order that the applicants' names appeared on the voting sheets, and that the order was as follows: Karl Schulz, Dave Ulloa, Cherie Combs, Howard Rothenbach, Craig Bullock, Marla Alvarez and Mike Napolitano. She explained the voting process, and suggested the Council vote first on filling the two four-year terms, and then vote to fill the unexpired term from the five remaining applicants.

Following a vote by the Council, Dave Ulloa and Mike Napolitano were appointed to the two 4year terms ending June 1, 2006 and Cherie Combs was appointed to fill the unexpired term ending June 1, 2004.

Mr. Hanway, Financial Services Director, stated the Council approved an ordinance on December 12, 1995, establishing the collection of the Transient Parking Tax (TPT) at a rate of ten percent. He outlined the following exceptions to the TPT: those who do not pay for parking; those who pay to park on a monthly basis or longer; those who pay to park in a hospital; those who pay to park in a medical facility; those who pay to park via a City-owned parking meter; or, those who are a prohibited individual as defined by Federal and State laws, such as United States government officials and military

personnel, diplomats, etc. He informed the Council that subsequent to the adoption of the TPT, Proposition 218 was approved by the voters which, on a retroactive basis, required voter approval of tax increases and property-related fees, and that at the April 8, 1997 General Municipal Election, the voters of Burbank approved the imposition and collection of the TPT by 61 percent. He noted the TPT currently generates a little less than two percent of general fund revenues.

Mr. Hanway stated nine cities in California currently impose a TPT, with rates ranging from six percent to twenty-five percent, adding that staff recommended a two percent increase raising Burbank's rate to twelve percent. He noted the Council could also consider establishing other economic escalators to the current fee, adding that none of the cities surveyed have established escalators to their TPT. He noted Proposition 218 requires that any general tax imposed by local governments after January 1, 1995 be approved by a majority of the voters at a general election, giving Burbank the opportunity to put the measure on the ballot every two years.

Following discussion, it was the consensus of the Council that "staff be directed to bring back a draft ordinance to present to the voters an increase in the Transient Parking Tax of a certain amount yet to be determined with the ability to adjust under that maximum amount by some manner either by Council action or by an automatic adjustment such as the CPI."

804-5 405-2 Home Depot Project – Former ITT Site Ms. Davidson-Guerra, Senior Redevelopment Project Manager, stated the purpose of this report was to present for Council consideration a proposed Cooperation and Tax Sharing Agreement between the cities of Burbank and Glendale as related to the proposed Home Depot store to be located on the former ITT site, explaining that the Agreement outlines the specific roles each municipality would play in an entitlement process as well as outlining the structure for a sales tax sharing agreement. She noted the former ITT site, located in the southern-most end of the city, within the South San Fernando Redevelopment Project Area, is an 11-acre site with roughly two acres lying within the jurisdiction of the City of Glendale, and the balance of the site, or nine acres, falling within the City of Burbank, and that the property is currently in escrow with Home Depot conditioned upon the receipt of entitlements for a Home Depot store.

Ms. Davidson-Guerra informed the Council that Home Depot has submitted a land use application packet to the City for the development of a 115,130 square foot home improvement center with an additional 24,677 square foot outdoor garden center in the M-2 General Manufacturing zone. She highlighted the terms of the proposed agreement as they relate to land use, including: that Burbank would be the lead agency for the preparation of all environmental documents required for the project under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), although Glendale would participate in the CEQA review process; that Burbank would process and consider Home Depot's request to approve the discretionary land use entitlements for the project; that the City Engineers from both jurisdictions would approve any street improvement plans; that Burbank would issue all building permits, predicated upon Glendale's Engineering approval by and Traffic Transportation Sections, and the Glendale Unified School District; and, that both Burbank and Glendale would reserve the authority to enforce their own Municipal Code on that area of the project site falling within the respective jurisdictions.

Ms. Davidson-Guerra discussed the tax sharing proposal, stating the ratio was based on the square footage of building falling within each jurisdiction, noting the breakdown equates to about 23 percent of the building falling within the City of Glendale and 77 percent of the building falling within the City of Burbank. She stated both cities would receive their respective portions of the sales tax directly from the State Board of Equalization. She discussed the resources used to determine anticipated sales volumes, which totaled annual estimated sales revenues of \$40 million, and \$400,000 in total annual sales tax, and stated using the proposed sales tax sharing ratio (23 percent to Glendale and 77 percent to Burbank), the City of Burbank could realize sales tax revenue estimated at \$308,000. In conclusion, she stated the Glendale City Council had approved the proposed Cooperation Agreement at their meeting of October 1, 2002.
